# Newspapers and the Truth

N his 1848 novel, Loss and Gain, Blessed John Henry Newman makes one of his characters say this: My father never could endure newspapers — I mean the system of newspapers; he said it was a new power in the State. Of course the work of a journalist can be done honourably, or else they would hardly have been given their own patron saint (it is Francis de Sales). To discover and publish truths that can help society is a noble calling. Yet, it is not too hard, I think, to see what Newman was driving at. Uninvested with civil authority, the newspaper proprietor or editor yet has a vast influence upon the thinking of his fellow citizens and therefore upon the manners and morals of his age. Probably even greater power is enjoyed by those who rule in the world of television, since a viewer is still more passive than a reader...

Why make these observations now? A week or so ago we saw newspapers all over the world seemingly united in distorting some words spoken by Pope Benedict XVI in an interview with a journalist. This is not the place to go into the moral question that was raised. Suffice it to say on that point that the Church can never change her teaching on the sanctity of marriage and its openness to life. What must strike us, though, is how the journalistic art was turned by many to an end clean contrary to its proper one: to mislead, and not to enlighten, the greatest possible number.

Of course, this is not a new problem, perhaps especially in Church affairs. To a correspondent who wanted to know what was happening at the First Vatican Council (1869-70), Cardinal Manning wrote from Rome that she should study the English newspapers as attentively as possible, and then believe the opposite! But if it is not a new problem, it is perhaps a worsening one, not least because headlines that tell 'the opposite of the truth' can now be generated everywhere at the same moment.

Fortunately, we have some better sources of information at our disposal. St Paul tells us today that God gave us the Holy Scriptures for our 'encouragement', or, as another translation has it, to be our 'consolation'. If we are disturbed by the half-truths or downright untruths that sometimes swirl around us, we can find refuge in that shelter, where everything speaks of Christ. This Advent, why not spend less time with the uncertain media of men, and more with those most certain Scriptures?

PLEASE SUPPORT THE SVP IN THE SUDAN. In 1988 we opened a feeding centre which fed 230 babies every other day; and the programme peaked at 10,000 babies a day for 5 days a week. The centres are near camps for displaced people not far from Khartoum. Vast numbers of the population have been displaced because of unrest in the Sudan and Darfur. The SVP is running this programme and keeping babies alive and giving them hope for the future. It costs £40 a year for each baby to provide nourishing food. Would you like to help? £40 for a year's food, or £20 for six months or £100 for vocational training for 2 adults or £60 for medical treatment for 20 patients. 
MONEY MATTERS: Last Weekend's collections - Figures are not yet to hand (the Newsletter has gone to press early this week). More news next week.
