Just Give Up

N LENT we ordinarily give up something. It's practically expected. People say to each other, 'What are you giving up for Lent?' and they expect an answer which is not going to be 'Nothing at all'.

Some people will say that it's not giving up something we should do. They say we ought to do something 'positive' and take on a new activity (something good, no doubt) as our Lenten penance. It's a nice idea, except it's not penance. And as for these good things, we ought to start doing them all the time, not just in Lent.

Some people say they are going to give up something bad for Lent. Like smoking. Or gossiping. But the bad things are what we should give up all the time, not just in Lent. And even if the bad things were not bad in themselves, Lent is not in itself a season for dieting or detox. Those are for the first couple of weeks of January, until we forget or discontinue our New Year's resolutions.

So if Lent is not about adding good things or subtracting the bad (both these should be done all the time!), what's left?

Yes, you've guessed it. The penance of Lent is about giving up something good. And why would we want to do such a mad thing? Because the world has a lot of good things, and we are rightly see and appreciate them as good things. The goodness of all these good things is due to their Maker and ours: God, the Supreme Good - and our Supreme Good. Because we owe our existence and all the good of our lives to him, we also owe God the due of worship. We worship God not because he needs us to for his sake, but because we need to for our sake. We need to humble ourselves before Him, and worship the One who loves us graciously, gratuitously. Why? Because not doing so is not only ingratitude. It's insanity. Insanity to behave like we are self-made, self-sufficient creatures - when a clear, dispassionate look at any of our lives plainly shows we're not.

So we give up something good because we need to offer a present to God, to remind our bodies and souls that God is our supreme good, to draw nearer in love to that Supreme Good. Love, for us, must always involve sacrifice. So we can't say we love God if we are unwilling to show it.

Lent has just started. It's not too late to get started ourselves. Pick something good you enjoy or love, and give it up for Lent - for the love of God. Don't make a fuss; don't broadcast it; don't make a show of it. Just give it to God as your present, 'and your Father who sees in secret will reward you in secret'.

A reminder: the forty days of Lent run from Ash Wednesday to Holy Saturday inclusive, but don't include the Sundays in between. Count them yourself if you don't believe me. On Sundays we are meant to rejoice and are forbidden to fast - and I suppose that implies a break from your Lenten sacrifice!
