

The Mother of Sorrows

GOODNESS is often sold as a means to happiness. The good person is the happy person, and no-one is truly happy who is not truly good. The second claim is more plausible than the first. A lack of something which is required for a human being to be a good human being will always be an obstacle to happiness. Yet goodness does not automatically mean happiness. The feast of Our Lady, the mother of sorrows, which we celebrated last Monday is proof of that. Mary, conceived without sin, is also the the mother of sorrows, she whose heart was pierced.


Faced with this, we should not then turn around and preach the reverse, that goodness itself is a source of sorrow. Mary proclaims herself in the magnificat as the one, 'whose spirit rejoices in God my saviour'. Her sorrows came from the sin of the world, not from herself. That is part of the solution. There is more to be said. Mary is not in sorrow now. She is in perfect joy, as she cooperates with the fulfilment of God's plan. The mediaeval church prayed the rosary as a way of sharing in the joy of Mary in heaven. The great suffering which Mary endured in this world, is not simply disposed of, put aside in heaven. Instead it is transformed into the joy which she now shares. God turns tears into joy, 'those that sow in tears will reap in joy' as the Psalmist says, (Psalm 126). This is no natural process. The transformation of the sorrows of this world into the joy of heaven is a miracle, akin to the miracle of the transformation of bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ. Following that analogy we can say that just as the bread and wine are not replaced by the Body and Blood of Christ, but become the Body and Blood, so the sorrows of this world are turned into the joys of heaven. This is what St Paul seems to be referring to in his First epistle to the Corinthians, Chapter 15. 'Listen, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed, a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed.' (Verses 52-53).

Not everything is suitable to be changed into the things of heaven. In *Veritatis Splendor*, Pope John Paul states that 'Reason attests that there are objects of the human act which are by their nature "incapable of being ordered" to God, because they radically contradict the good of the person made in his image.' The sorrows of Our Lady came from the contradiction between her goodness and the evils of the world. These are the sorrows which are suitable to be transformed into the joy of heaven, because they are transforming sorrows in themselves. They come from the yearning to transform the world, to share with it the joy of heaven. Such sorrows we should not only be willing to endure but should eagerly seek out.
