## Christmas Thoughts...

N Tavistock Square in London, there is a statue of Gandhi. The square is really a small park, near St Pancras station, and just next to London University. It's a peaceful place and yet on the 7th of July, 2005, a bomb went off on a bus, in view of the statue of Gandhi. Further down the street, there is the place where the physicist, Leo Szilard was caught waiting for the traffic lights to change. This was in 1933. The story goes that as he watched the lights change, he had the idea of a nuclear chain reaction, which was to pave the way for atomic energy but also unfortunately for atomic weapons. Maybe if they had had the congestion charge in 1933, Hiroshima would not have been bombed. Yet Tavistock Square is still a peaceful place, and evil leaves very little mark of its presence behind. Mark Anthony in Shakespeare's 'Julius Caesar' says, that

"The evil that men do lives after them; The good is oft interred with their bones;"

I don't think that that is true. Evil passes quickly, and the good survives. There is always more peace than war, more love than hate. That is true by definition. Evil is the absence of Good, some part of the Good which is missing, and in Tavistock Square life goes on. All over the world, people are trying to get on with their lives and that is the big truth, which no amount of terror and violence should make us forget. Even in war, the farmers farm, nurses care for the sick and mothers care for their children, and the struggle to live goes on.

Christmas seems to me to be a symbol of this. A great deal of evil happens in the Christmas story, homelessness, exile, indifference, jealousy and murder. Yet in the centre of this story, there is a hope which is not extinguished. The Christmas story takes place in cold bitter circumstances. Evil swirls around the Holy Family, yet they are safe. There is darkness here but it is not yet the hour of darkness. That comes later. The holy family are safe, and safe because they are meant to be safe. If the triumph of good were only at the end of time, when the definitive victory will come, then life would be insupportable. Hope is meant to lead us on through life, not just make us sit down and wait for the kingdom. If the cross is part of life, so are the many little resurrections. Shakespeare spoke through more mouthpieces than Mark Antony and in one of his last plays, A Winter's tale, he wrote about redemption. Winter seems to be a good season to write about redemption, as witnessed by A Christmas Carol. In the play, Cleomenes speaks to Leontes who has betrayed and lost his wife and daughter. There will be a reconciliation but before this happens he says to Leontes who has spent his life in penance for his sins:

"at the last, Do as the heavens have done, forget your evil; With them forgive yourself."

In the cold and the dark, we know that light and warmth are the natural things, we share them with each other while they are scarce, to get ready for the abundance of light and warmth, which one day, through Christ will be ours forever.
