

Fasting

MOST of us know that Lent is a time for fasting and abstinence. Our Lord set the example by his forty days' fast in the wilderness, during which time, St Luke says, he ate nothing at all. That was a work of divine power, as well as of human endurance, and so we cannot hope to reproduce it. But how should we fast during Lent, and why should we do it?

To answer the 'why' question first, the tradition of the Church distinguishes three reasons for fasting. First, it's a powerful way of doing penance for sins. It's mysterious but true that sin is *an offence against God*. We cannot fully understand what this means, just as we can't fully understand how Christ is truly God and truly man, or how the Father, Son and Holy Spirit are one God. But we can say that sin is a kind of stealing from God, since it deprives him of the 'external glory' which is his due. That's why sin must be expiated.

Secondly, the Church recommends fasting as a way of lessening 'concupiscence'. Concupiscence means those desires within us which can lead us to sin. It's a consequence of the Fall which is not removed by baptism; but it can be held in check by self-denial. Thirdly, fasting is considered as an aid to prayer, since when the body is less weighed down, the spirit is better able to rise toward God – or so says St Thomas Aquinas, among others.

It must have been the apostles themselves who introduced the Fast before Easter, since otherwise it wouldn't extend through the whole Church, both East and West. At the moment, our obligatory Lenten fast is very mild, limited to Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. But traditionally, it is every day of Lent which is a fast day, except for Sundays, where the joy of the resurrection would make penance incongruous. As late as the mid 20th Century, the principle of the 40 days of Lenten fast was maintained intact.

The Church's law of fasting was always reasonable and humane. Dispensations were readily available for those doing manual labour or other tiring work, and of course for the infirm and elderly. Again, though only one ordinary meal is taken on a fast day, two 'collations' or small portions of food may be taken at other times, for example in the morning and the evening.

Fasting is not an end in itself, of course. As St Jerome once said, 'God is not glorified by the rumbling of my belly'! It is meant, like everything else we do or say, to serve charity: the prophet Isaiah has some strong words for those who fast and oppress the poor. But the example of our Lord's 40 day fast holds good for all time. And as we look at the world around us, or at our own lives, would it not be good if we recovered something of our ancient strictness this Lent? Even if we cannot fast every day, we can try to do more than the bare minimum. After all, we have Christ's promise, 'Your Father who sees in secret will reward you.'

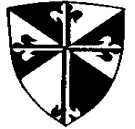
