

## LENT - A TIME OF HOPE

**P**ERHAPS we don't think of Lent particularly as a time of hope. Penance, repentance, prayer and the other Lenten observances seem to loom larger. But when you come to think of it, Lent is a preparation for Easter, so it must be a time for looking forward. And what is hope but a looking forward to the good things we desire? So, for example, we might hope for good weather during our holiday, or success in a job application, or recovery from illness for ourselves or others. This is hope as a human disposition, and some people are more hopeful, more optimistic, than others because it is part of their natural make-up. Sadly, these hopes can all too often be disappointed.

But when we talk about the virtue of Hope, we mean one of those gifts of God which have a direct bearing on our friendship with Him. (The other two are Faith and Charity.) So Hope is a God-given disposition by which we co-operate with God's plan and providence, knowing that it is for our good. Hope makes us confident that God is working out his purpose to establish his Kingdom in his creation, even when that does not seem to be happening.

This is the objective of our Hope. But we tend to think of Hope on a narrower individual level. If you ask someone what they hope for, as a Christian, the answer is likely to be something along the lines of: 'I hope to get to heaven', or 'I hope to be with God'. In other words we tend to think first of our personal destiny, rather than of the larger scene within which we will have a place. This means that effectively we leave the resurrection out of account.

Our image of what heaven will be like may often be influenced by those parts of Scripture (the Apocalypse, the Prophet Isaiah) which speak of the angels worshipping around the throne of God. This can lead to the silly idea that, for us, heaven means sitting on clouds playing harps! But the Apocalypse ends with the vision of God's 'new heaven and new earth', the eternal city, the New Jerusalem 'coming down out of heaven from God', all of which is the outcome of the Resurrection of Jesus.

The purpose of God, towards which our hope is directed, is this new heaven and earth. It is the perfected human city, the redeemed and glorified human community living in the glorified material world in which God's purposes are at last perfectly expressed. That will be the grounds for our worship and praise of Father, Son and Spirit; but we will be living as God has created us to be, as human beings, body and soul, not as angels. Though we cannot guess what this will be like, there will be a real continuity between our present life and the life to come, in that the one is the perfection of the other, rather than its contrary. This gives us an incentive to work for God's will to be done now, to struggle for justice, peace and holiness, precisely because what we strive for now will be achieved in the future coming of the Kingdom of God. In the long run God's will cannot be thwarted. So this kind of hope cannot be disappointed.



The Saint Vincent de Paul Society is organising a national campaign to address the injustices experienced by asylum seekers, one of the most marginalised, impoverished and misrepresented groups of people in our society. The SVP is asking people to sign a petition which John Battle, Member of Parliament for Leeds West, will present in the House of Commons. The petition asks for rights and services for asylum seekers in order to prevent destitution and social exclusion. **Please sign the petition on your way out after Mass.** Many Thanks.

**Red Cross Appeal for Refugees & Asylum Seekers.** Rice, cooking oil and cereal bars are urgently needed. The full list of items needed to support these destitute and vulnerable people is:

- ◆ Dried items: rice, pasta, cous-cous, maize mealie-meal, sugar, salt, porridge, cooking oil, flour (self-raising), spices, palenta, mashed potato (Smash), tea, coffee, powdered milk, water, fruit juice, semolina;
- ◆ Tins: fish, meat, pulses, baked beans, soup, fruit, rice pudding, sauces, vegetables;
- ◆ Pre-prepared food: cereal bars, chocolate, biscuits, nuts, crisps, pot noodles;
- ◆ Baby items: nappies (sizes 2-4), baby wipes, food, milk, lotion, talc, clothing, equipment;
- ◆ Toiletries: toothpaste, tooth brush, soap, moisturiser, shampoo, conditioner, toilet paper.
