# Lost and Found

HEN the women disciples went to the tomb of Jesus with spices, it was to embalm the body. They did not want it to wither away. They wanted to preserve it, to hold on to it, to stay in touch with it. But the precious body of the Lord was not there.

They meet the risen Christ only when they have turned away from the tomb, and left everything behind them. Why seek the Living among the dead? Jesus reveals himself to them, greeting them or calling them by name. The spontaneous reaction this evokes is the desire to hang on; the women fall at His feet and cling to Him. It is almost as if they wish to ensure that He stays there — firmly planted in their midst. They must not lose Him ever again.

Mary Magdalene also would like to lay hold of Him, that He might not ever leave her. But Jesus says, 'Do not touch Me, for I have not yet ascended to My Father.' Yet with Thomas, the only one who clings to the literal death of Jesus, the risen Lord actually forces him to touch His sacred wounds.

Pondering this apparent discrepancy, Blaise Pascal concluded, 'The risen Christ does not want to be touched, except in His wounds.' And more than that, it is through His glorified wounds that Jesus lays hold of us. The Resurrection of the Lord shows us that the only way we can stay in touch with Him is by allowing ourselves to be touched by Him and in bringing His touch to others.

The lesson that the earliest Christians learned is necessary for us too. We need to allow ourselves to be touched by Christ, to be drawn into communion with Him. The poet R. S. Thomas writes:

He is such a fast God, always before us and Leaving us as we arrive.

We often imagine ourselves pursuing an elusive God, trying to find Him as the treasure in the field. The truth of the Resurrection is that He finds us. The seekers at the tomb could not find Him until He had found them. His disciples could not recognise Him until He granted them vision, opening their minds in calling them by name, making their hearts burn within them. Redemption is allowing oneself to be found by God. When He finds you, hold nothing back from Him. 'For I greet Him all the days that I meet Him...and bless when I understand.'
