

## Providence

**W**HEN I was in the Edinburgh priory, I remember a conversation about providence, the belief that God has a plan for all of us and is taking care of each of us, giving us what we need. I said that I thought a preacher had to have a very strong belief in providence: if we were relying on our own skill and learning for the words we preach, where would we be? Instead, the experience of preaching is definitely of being given the words to say, and even of people hearing not necessarily what you said, but what they needed to hear. God is so very obviously present in the whole process. Anyway, when I said how important providence was to preaching, an old friar, Bede Bailey, who loved to argue with me, spoke up. "That's the first time I think I've ever agreed with you," he said.

I was reminded of the conversation during Blackfriars Market, because on the book stall was a book, edited by this same Bede, of the letters of another Bede - Bede Jarrett - who was our Provincial from 1916 to 1932. Whoever bought the book, it is a treasure. The letters show the pastoral kindness of a very good man, but above all, they show his tremendous faith in God's providence.

In a number of cases, he has people writing to him, anxious about what to do about this or that. He gives sensible and kind advice in some cases, or at least helps the people writing to think clearly about what is involved in their making the right decision, but he always says something like, "Try not to worry. It's not your job to worry. God has this in His hands." The letters show again and again his strong belief in God's providence.

It's very hard sometimes not to worry. Our papers are full of stories to make us worry. Some editors even, I think, sell their newspapers by filling them with stories that feed on and confirm our fears, which is wicked, but there is enough to worry about even without that. The latest story of course is the swine flu. Newspapers are already running columns alongside their report of the spread of the disease advising us about what to do to avoid getting it and what to do if we're worried we already have it.

Belief in providence shouldn't make us ignore this kind of advice. I have one friend who thinks going to the doctor shows a lack of trust in God. She thinks Christians should just expect God to heal them directly. But God has given us the ability to understand our bodies and to learn how to heal ourselves. After all, by tradition, St Luke was a doctor! Used properly, medical care can be as much part of God's providence, of how He takes care of us and heals us, as when He cures someone miraculously.

What providence should help with, though, is the sense of being powerless in the face of a threat we can do very little about. The main reason the papers give us advice about what to do in order not to get ill is that we quite correctly respond to a threat by trying to avoid it. We deal with our anxiety by feeling there is something we can do. The reason anxiety remains is that we are left with a nagging feeling that even if we do the best we can for ourselves and for our families we may still be affected. A belief in providence helps us see that whatever comes, God will be with us, holding us in His hands, that, though we should do our best, ultimately we don't have to depend on ourselves.

And that leaves us with a very important thing to do in times of crises: we can pray. A very important part of the kind of prayer that asks things of God is that it shows our faith in God's providence. It says, "I can't do this alone, but I know I am not alone. I have you, God, for my help."
