

JESUS: Teacher or Saviour?

IN Humberstone Gate, opposite Sainsbury's, there is a smallish late-Victorian building, which you might not notice because of all the buses parked beside it. It is the premises of the Leicester Secular Society, the meeting place of those who do not hold to any faith or religion but who think human reason alone can give us all the guidance we need about how we should live our lives. The front of this building is decorated with five small stone busts of eminent men from the past, people who were no doubt respected by members of the Secular Society. The five are Robert Owen, Thomas Paine, Voltaire, Socrates – and Jesus.

Why is Jesus in this group? The other men are champions of reason, teachers of good morals and behaviour, who worked hard to rid the world of ignorance and superstition, as they saw it. Nowadays such a group might include people like Richard Dawkins and Philip Pullman. Presumably the original members of the Secular Society thought about Jesus in much the same way, as an inspired and inspiring teacher, who spoke great wisdom but who suffered persecution and died a tragic death, not unlike Socrates.

Well, we don't think of Jesus quite like that, and I think he seems rather out of place in his little niche along with the others on the façade of the Secular Society. Of course, Jesus did teach, constantly. For example, today's Gospel reading says that Jesus had pity on the crowds because 'they were like sheep without a shepherd, and he set himself to teach them at some length'. And there are all the parables, the Sermon on the Mount and his discussions and arguments with people, all of which record what Jesus taught.

None the less, Jesus is not primarily our Teacher, but our Redeemer, our Saviour. The deepest human need is to be rescued, not just from our ignorance and stupidity, but from sin: from ill will and from evil powers that are stronger than us. When we listen to Jesus, it is not the same as listening to Socrates or Voltaire, hoping for sound thought, good advice and helpful ideas about how to live well and to right wrongs. We will indeed get all this from Jesus; but that is not the heart of Jesus' message. We listen to him to hear words of salvation, to dispose ourselves to receive God's forgiveness and seek the new life he promises us. Jesus' message is Gospel, 'good news', the good news that our imprisonment in sin and evil is finished, that we now have boundless hope, not because we are wise and resourceful, but because God in human flesh has pioneered the way for us to reach what we are unable to reach by our own strength and knowledge: the new heavens and the new earth.

So we come to Mass, not primarily in order to learn something – though hopefully we do gradually learn much, week by week. We come first to express our worship and gratitude because God has chosen us to share in the divine and human life of Jesus, to be 'sons in the Son'. We are able to be by adoption what Christ is by nature, through his death on the cross. All is gift – God's gift which we gratefully accept – not our own achievement.

Red Cross Appeal for Refugees & Asylum Seekers. The full list of items needed to support these destitute and vulnerable people is:

- ◆ Dried items: rice, pasta, cous-cous, maize mealie-meal, sugar, salt, porridge, cooking oil, flour (self-raising), spices, palenta, mashed potato (Smash), tea, coffee, powdered milk, water, fruit juice, semolina;
- ◆ Tins: fish, meat, pulses, baked beans, soup, fruit, rice pudding, sauces, vegetables;
- ◆ Pre-prepared food: cereal bars, chocolate, biscuits, nuts, crisps, pot noodles;
- ◆ Baby items: nappies (sizes 2-4), baby wipes, food, milk, lotion, talc, clothing, equipment;
- ◆ Toiletries: sanitary towels, shaving equipment, toothpaste, tooth brush, soap, moisturiser, shampoo, conditioner, toilet paper;
- ◆ Others: Tin openers, pans, cutlery, towels and sleeping bags.

Today's Gospel: The crowds flock to Jesus.

Celebrating New Walk. Two events will be taking place to mark the 40th anniversary of New Walk becoming a conservation area. There is an exhibition at New Walk Museum from 25 July to 24 September. Over 100 students on a wide variety of arts courses have spent several months developing artwork for this exhibition facilitated by local artists and tutors. This includes a group which meets in St Clement's Hall. Each group has produced a collective piece of art for the exhibition and there are individual artworks too – paintings, drawings, and poems. Many of the students are people with learning difficulties. All have been inspired by the architecture, environment, and history of New Walk. And there are 6 guided walks covering different aspects of New Walk during the week 25 July to 1 August. All walks are free and start from New Walk Museum.
