

Feeding the multitude

TODAY'S Gospel tells us about Jesus miraculously feeding a large crowd. Certainly that was an expression of his compassion for those people who were eager to hear him and were now physically hungry.

Today's Gospel also prepares us to hear Jesus explain that he would nourish us with his word and with his own Body and Blood in the Eucharist. We need this nourishment if we are to share his eternal life. In the Mass. We are nourished by the Scripture readings, the Creed, and, hopefully, the sermon. Our response is to welcome his word with living faith. This prepares us to receive our crucified and risen Lord in Holy Communion.

But as we look at Christ feeding the multitude we realise that God does not do all the work in feeding us. Jesus first asked the disciples where they could buy bread to feed the crowd. Philip realised that they simply didn't have enough money to purchase food for such a large number of people. Although Andrew pointed to a lad who had five barley loaves and two fishes he realised that that would go nowhere in feeding the crowd. Both disciples were convinced that they had insufficient resources to feed the multitude.

But, undaunted, Jesus made the crowd sit down and prepare to be fed. He then told the disciples to distribute the little food, which the lad had. Miraculously, that proved to be more than sufficient for everyone.

Inevitably we ask, 'Why doesn't God always miraculously feed the starving people of the world?' His answer is to throw the question back at us. He asks us 'Why don't we come to their aid?' God usually provides for our needs and answers our prayers by working through our efforts. He gives us the strength and skill to develop the resources of the fertile world he has created.

Today's Gospel shows the disciples distributing the food that was already available – the boy's loaves and fishes. With these he fed the crowd. That's telling us something very important. Usually, instead of performing miracles to solve our problems, Jesus expects those of us who have to share with those who have not. This is much more than social justice in giving welfare aid. It's a question of practical love for our brothers and sisters in their need. Using our resources also means using our skills to enable people to have the dignity of being able to provide for themselves and become involved in international trade.

There are many ways of looking at today's Gospel. When Jesus fed the hungry crowd that was a sign of his compassion. At a deeper level this miracle foreshadowed his nourishing us with his teaching and his own Body and Blood. But today's Gospel incident also reminds us that God answers our prayer for our daily bread by enabling us to share and develop the resources he has already given us.




Noticeboards are situated in the New Walk and Wellington Street entrances and at the back of the church in the Narthex. If you don't see what you are looking for, please check the other boards.
