

The Spirit of the S.V.P.

THROUGHOUT the Gospels we see the compassionate Christ. He was sensitive to people's sufferings and wanted to help them. He healed the sick, fed the hungry, and welcomed the lonely, pushed to the fringe of society. Certainly this practical concern revealed Christ's sensitive caring humanity, a genuine love for people, and especially for those whom others thought were unimportant. He noticed them and welcomed them. But more than this, Christ's healing compassion revealed that the new, messianic age had dawned. In Christ there was a new creation in which all of us, who are in any way damaged, will be made whole.

Every Christian is called to identify with the compassionate Christ and share in his work. Now we are his instruments through whom he responds to people's various needs. As we do so we not only reflect Christ's human concern for the needy, but also share in furthering the messianic age, which began with the coming of Christ.

Members of the Saint Vincent de Paul Society are eager to identify with the compassionate Christ. They want to show his practical love and concern for those who are in any kind of need. They see themselves as instruments, servants of his love. Certainly they are inspired by human compassion. But this is transformed and enriched by Christian love. The people they assist are welcomed as God's children, for whom his Son lived among us and died for us, simply because God loves everyone and wants all of us to share his eternal happiness.

If the needy meet the compassionate Christ in those who care for them, they, in turn, meet Christ in those whom they assist. This is clear from Matthew's Gospel, chapter 25. Here Jesus tells us that he identifies with those who are in any kind of need.

Every Christian is called to identify with the compassionate Christ. Most of us do, especially in our loving concern for those are near and dear to us. But there are many lonely people who can easily be overlooked. Members of the S.V.P. try to make sure they are not.

As they do so, they meet Christ in his need and come to his assistance. And those whom they visit meet the compassionate Christ, who loves and cares for them. In such meetings there's a dialogue between Christ the given and Christ the receiver. Members of the S.V.P. insist that their Christian lives are enriched by those whom they visit.
